MEMORANDUM FOR All 4th Brigade JROTC Instructors

SUBJECT: Junior Reserve Officers' Training Corps (JROTC) Essay Contest

1. General.

a. The Junior Reserve Officers' Training Corps (JROTC) Essay Contest is an annual competition designed to give Cadets an opportunity to assimilate lessons learned from JROTC curriculum and communicate their knowledge in writing. Participating in the essay contest exposes Cadets to a key component of 21st Century Education: writing. Writing in accordance with national standards outlined in the Common Core States Standards help Cadets prepare for college and careers.

b. For SY 19-20, portions of the JROTC Essay Contest will be incorporated into the JROTC Leadership and Academic Bowl (JLAB) 2020. Out of the possible thousands of essays submitted by Cadets, the JROTC Directorate will select the top essays as the national winners. The national winners will win an all-expense paid roundtrip to JLAB 2020 at Catholic University of America in Washington, D.C., on 19-23 June 2020.

2. All Cadets enrolled in JROTC are encouraged to participate in the essay contest. A Cadet's essay will be their own work. Instructors will evaluate Cadets' essays using the enclosed rubric and select **one** essay to submit to the Brigade NLT 14 February 2020. The brigade will evaluate and select the top 3 essays using the enclosed rubric and submit them to the JROTC Directorate. The JROTC Directorate will select the national winners.

3. Essay Guidance. The length of the essays will be 2-3 pages, excluding cover page. Pages within the essay, including cover page, must adhere to the following:

a. Essay Theme: "Live Your Life with Integrity, Lose with Dignity, Win with Humility".

b. Layout:

(1) Font Type: Times New Roman

(2) Font size: 12.

(3) Spacing: Double.

(4) Margins: 1 inch on all sides.

c. Cover page will identify Cadet's:

(1) First and last name.

(2) Home address (street, city, state, and zip code)

(3) LET number

(4) High school name

(5) High school address (street, city, state, and zip code)


(6) SAI or AI name, phone number, and email address
